| "Reinventing your PC Password"  If you're a typical web user, you have 6.5 passwords,each of51 is used at four sites, and you're forced to52 one eight times53 day. Your employer likely makes you create a new one every three54 At some point, you've55 scrawled a password on a Post-it, e-mailed one to yourself, or made other security-breaching concessions to the impossibility of56 so many strings of gobbledygook. Today we don't have passwords so much as coping systems.  There has to be a better way – and it's taking57 inside Carnegie Mellon Univeristy's CyLab, where professors are studying not just the mathematical theory behind passwords but the way humans58 use them. They're sceptical of59, like iris60 (great in the movies; expensive and flawed in the real world), and accept that for regular people accessing Websites and PC's61 are what we're stuck with. Their findings call into62 virtually everything you've been told about what63 a password "strong". And they take the radical stance that you the64, should be listened to when passwords become overbearing, not yelled at when you65 them.
